# **Giving Korea 2025: Trends in Performance and Impact Measurement within the Nonprofit Ecosystem\*(2015-2025)**

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\*In the nonprofit ecosystem, not only nonprofit organizations that directly deliver services for the public good but also intermediary support organizations and corporate social responsibility (CSR) activities play important roles. In addition, various types of organizations in the social economy, which pursue both social and imancial value, are engaged in activities for the public interest. Accordingly, this study defines the nonprofit ecosystem as the space in which diverse types of organizations—such as nonprofit and hybrid organizations—interact for the public good while measuring their performance and impact.

#### Why Performance and Impact?

- Obligation to report to stakeholders (donors)
- A measure of achieving the organization's mission and vision
- A communication tool: "Performance and impact measurement and evaluation, as a strategic management, are essential tools for transparent communication with diverse stakeholders." (OECD, 2024).

"In fact, measuring performance or impact may not actually be helpful for traditional nonprofit organizations" (Carman, 2011).

"When resources are limited, the evaluation process itself can become a burden" (Akwetey et al., 2024). "Although there is growing consensus on the importance of impact measurement, this does not necessarily mean that every organization must measure its impact. Each organization should determine whether it is necessary based on its context and measure impact using methods and at levels that are appropriate" ("Ten Reasons Not to Measure Impact—and What to Do Instead," SSIR, 2018).

#### The Performance and Impact Journey: Expanding through Learning and Collaboration

- Continuity of Performance and Impact: Connect to the performance and philanthropic activities that nonprofit organizations have been pursued
- Specific Purpose: Organizational capacity building through a specific goal setting and measurement processes such as persuasion, strategy, and learning
- Specified Measurement Units: Impact at the program, organizational, and ecosystem levels
- Creating and balancing collective performance among diverse stakeholders
- 'Performance and Impact' as a process of collectively recognizing and solving social agendas
